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


The term 'Berber' derives from the Greek **barbario** and the Latin **barbari** from which Arabs derived the term '**barbariy**', meaning **primitive or foreign**.

Amazigh, plural Imazighen, a word which means "free people" in the Indigenous Tamazight language.



Berbers, the indigenous people of North Africa, live in Algeria, Libya, Mauritania, Mali, Morocco, Niger and Tunisia. In several countries they are fighting for national and cultural autonomy The Berbers of Morocco are the descendants of the prehistoric Caspian culture of North Africa. The **de-Berberization** of North Africa began with Punic settlement and accelerated under Roman, Vandal, Byzantine and Arab rule.







The Berber culture celebrates the same holidays as the rest of the country, such as Ramadan and Eid al Adha. But they also have their own unique holidays and celebrations. Yennayer is the most wellknown. It's the Amazigh New Year, and is based on the Amazigh agrarian calendar.
